


Figure 5. Warning lights on overlength load or loads with a rear-end overhang of more than four feet.

HARMONIZED: Visibility and Color of the Light

Should states require warning lights, SCOHT recommends setting a threshold that the light be visible for at least 500 feet in a full 360 degree circle from the light. States may require lower visibility limits. SCOHT recommends that lights be amber, and be either flashing or strobe with the choice at the carrier's discretion.

Figures 4 and 5 show examples of potential placements of warning lights.

4.13 Warning Signs

When required as a condition of the permit by the issuing state, required warning signs should be in evidence during all movements. States may choose to require warning signs at their discretion.

HARMONIZED: Sign Size and Lettering

States are encouraged to not set the threshold for minimum sign size at larger than 18-in. high by 7-ft wide. Carriers may choose to have larger signs at their discretion, and states may choose to allow smaller signs.

States are encouraged to set a threshold for sign letters at no greater than 10 inches high by 1.4-in. wide with a 1.5-in. brush stroke. Carriers may choose to have larger lettering at their discretion, and states may choose to allow smaller lettering.
